3. What concerns do you have about the Keystone Public schools?

- Not enough financial resources to provide the needed programs and materials
- Large Class Sizes
- No classroom aides or elementary guidance program
- Need more advanced classes and opportunities for the more able students to enrich and challenge them
- Pay to participate is too costly
- Losing marginal players, who would benefit from participating because of pay to play
- Not enough enriching field trips

- Transportation has been cut drastically at all levels, a safety issue
- Funding/taxes too high
- Concerns of behavior and language
- Students don't feel safe
- Sex education classes as they are taught now encourages the activity of sex
- Poor people skills with Administration
- Concern for seriousness of sports programs that takes away family time and religion on weekends, etc.
- Concern for lack of sportsman-like behavior in students and parents
- Too many movies that seem non-educational
- Sidewalks put in as soon as possible to high school. The students walked in the dark on snow-covered road back to the school. Very dangerous.
- Hold teachers accountable. For instance, math teachers do not seem to be teaching up to standards. High School graduates from Keystone cannot do college level math entrance exams. Why do we have a folder full of complaints and they are still not teaching.
- Get quality and experienced teachers who aren't just biding their time until retirement
- Get rid of "tenure"
- Get better lunches: Salad bars, grilled chicken
- More help from teachers for students (e.g. during study hall or after school)
- The lack of parenting
- Teachers need to help and communicate with parents. Teachers don't care. (Middle School, High School)
- Safety in the school. Is it secure at all times? Making sure people are checked out that deal with kids.
- Racism
- Want it to be the best school in the state.
- Money not being spend wisely
- Will the high school be big enough to hold the increasing population?
- The middle school experience. The overall dynamics could be better. High school is fine, KES is fine, MS is lacking something educationally. Will the high school be big enough to house the amount of KES of now in the future?
- More hands on learning
- Not covering everyday problems
- Sometimes there are teachers who have repeated problems with students but they continue to teach
- No opportunities for drama. Children need opportunities for many creative outlets. The Choir and band programs are great, especially at the Middle and High School level, but we need more.
- Students need support and enrichment at the early elementary levels.
- Students are not prepared for transitions between levels. i.e., elementary supports and guides, middle school "get 'er done" or
- Students with talent in Math have limited options through the gifted program

- Guidance doesn't support transitions (elem to Middle) Middle to HS, HS to college as well as some other High Schools do.
- 9th & 10th graders have difficulty with transportation to the High School.
- That substitute teachers don't get benefits.
- Some kid's families complain about politics in sports, but it's not true in what we see.
- Kids accepting each other. Cliques – kids NOT accepting other kids; division between the “haves” and the “have-nots.”
- Building conditions, buildings sitting vacant.
- The fact that we now have two elementary school buildings sitting empty and then at a later date we will be told that we need more room and have outgrown our buildings.
- Money management.
- Upgrade of elementary school and concerned that we should go after more grants to better district.
- Cliquey—not always fair.
- Safety.
- Pay to play outrageous---pay pay pay out of parents' pockets.
- Physical education is not good.
- Public awareness of policies regarding violence and weapons. (What procedures are in place?)
- Financial sovereignty
- Condition of the closed facilities.
- Cost for maintaining closed facilities.
- Utilization of resources, what is to be done with the disassembled playground equipment from closed facilities? Can't it be used at the LaGrange elementary?
- Control of access to the facilities. Anyone can wander in from the streets.
- Student safety – terrorist acts.
- LaGrange Elementary is not suitable for use. After all, we had to have the new high school so the middle school would not have to use that same building.
- Access to the middle school and rear of elementary schools by emergency equipment if something blocks the one street that currently provides access.
- Is the curriculum up to date? Students at other schools (Lakewood) are being taught higher level material at an earlier age.
- Why has the street to the high school from 303 never been opened?
- Are long range plans to move the elementary to the current middle school and build a new middle school near the high school?
- Lack of communication with the general public.
- School Board members, their qualifications, and positions unknown to public. Should have a “meet the candidate night” prior to elections.
- All the school news is positive showing the students doing so well. So why does the school always say they need money?
- I'm concerned that the community will never pass a levy and the district will then never have the resources it really needs.
- Don't offer enough elective courses at the high school

- We need to make the extracurricular activities a higher priority than it is. Programs such as choir, band, athletics, need to be more important than they are.
- I'm concerned at some of the coaching leadership.
- I'm very concerned that without busing at the high school, there's going to be an accident.
- I'm very concerned with the fact that so many counselors and paraprofessionals have been cut. I think there are many students with mental problems & issues ("time bombs") who need support.
- I think there are a lot of inequities among various activities: band/choir v. athletics. Why does the money for pay to participate go? Is it distributed evenly?
- Are my taxes going to go up?
- Pay to play
- The elementary and middle school buildings are not secure or safe.
- The office shouldn't be down the hall. (Elem/MS)
- Some teachers are just here for the job, not for the kids.
- The principals don't attend enough after-school functions.
- I'm very concerned that Keystone cannot pass their levies.
- I'm afraid a lack of knowledge will prevent us from eventually getting a new elementary and middle school.
- I think the middle school and elementary school lack security.
- I'm afraid that my child who is a little behind will get lost in the shuffle.
- My biggest concern is that the opinions of a few negative people seem to overshadow the opinion of the majority positive.

4. What recommendations do you have for the Keystone Public Schools?

- Provide the best education given the financial constraints

- Get the union out, people need to do their jobs right. We are paying them to do this.

- Drama Club, etc. even if pay to participate

- Small school. More one on one. Parents get involved, teachers care
- Give senior citizens free pass for all school events
- Uniforms
- A tighter belt on the money. Some trips that are nothing but a day out of the classroom should not go. Some of our sports teams that go hundreds of miles (round trip) should not spend the money. Surely there are teams closer. Maybe it it's time to look at cutting are, band and choir. In this day and age students need to know how to read, write, math (without calculators) and computer skills. Yes, there are a few that may use one of the afore-mentioned courses, but that is minimal. Special needs students should be in our school and not bused to all the different schools as they are now. The special needs Supervisor should be doing follow-ups with all these students on a regular basis. What are other special needs teachers doing that ours apparently are not? There needs to be something done about all the people that miss work. When most work nine months unless there is a real medical reason they should be working. This costs the district thousands of dollars a year. If they were working in the private sector they would not have all the sick and personal days that the contracts give them.
- KES teachers to be on the same page in their teaching techniques. It seems as though there is a separation between "West Carlisle" teachers and "Penfield" even though they are now one.
- Uniforms
- Continue to work on drug control
- Community members should be active in supporting students especially at the early levels by listening to them read or reading to them or playing math games with them. (volunteer trainings are helpful, color coded reading and game levels make interactions simple)
- Community members should be active by coming into classrooms and talking with students about their careers (i.e., fireman, policeman, carpenter.) especially at the early elementary level.
- Make sure that kids succeed whether they are gifted, "normal," or in need of support that they feel safe and learn.
- Provide an consistent, clear avenue for handling complaints from parents about teachers so that issues can be resolved fairly and consistently for the benefit of all concerned.
- If multiple complaints occur, insure that procedures are in place to deal with those issues.
- Use resources wisely. Don't waste materials or equipment
- Get the state and federal government to support their mandates with additional money rather than reductions.
- Have ½ day kindergarten every day. What we are doing now is not good for young children.
- Provide opportunities for children who are not the most skilled to play sports.

- The emphasis on having to play a sport all year in order to participate at the high school level is costly and prohibitive to some children not to mention the pressure.
- Resolve the problem between colleges and the high school about weight of credit.
- Kids take less challenging classes to keep their grade point high. Some colleges have a 5 point scale others a 4 point scale.
- Offer PSO classes at the high school campus.
- Provide volunteer help for students with limited parent involvement.
- Better publicity for school activities so people in the community know what's going on. Make aware public service activities (ex: Walk for Diabetes, things at Christmas time).
- Zero tolerance for being a bully. Would like to mandate kids who bully to undergo an educational program of some kind.
- Need better publicity to get information...compared to other schools systems, more information needs to get out to the public.
- Regarding people living on fixed incomes, if there were more activities publicized, perhaps those on fixed incomes might no resent paying more taxes.
- Get parents engaged in their kids school work.
- A cooperation with a college so kids would have easier access.
- Credit course for older children that may be interested in teaching and work with teachers.
- To break cliques down, investigate possibility of wearing uniforms...anything to make the children more "equal."
- Let's get things together so our kids don't have to "pay to play" for any of the extras (sports, band, choir, etc.)
- Think school is doing OK job on keeping teaching end up—test scores are good.
- New elementary school.
- Better Athletic facilities
- Old stadium used for middle school sports and youth sports
- No more cut backs in transportation—restore high school busing

- Focus on what would help students for life instead cramming their heads with stuff they'll never use.
- Eliminate grades and use a pass / fail system.
- Keep grading system (3 people).
- Institute some manner of controlling access to the facilities.
- Publicize web site and any other sources of information about schools.
- Don't rely on the web site and Rural Urban to communicate with the public. Penfield residents who don't use computers have access to neither.
- Use local cable TV to provide information to the public instead of just sports.
- I wish I had an answer to why levies don't pass in this district, but I don't.
- We need a group to spear up more school spirit. We need a new fight song.
- Conflict Resolution or Mediation Programs to help kids solve problems and conflicts
- Kids with leadership skills need opportunities to develop them, and those who don't need help obtaining them.
- Increase security; Secure doors (Elem/MS)
- Check the curriculum of Keystone v. other districts. My child transferred her from another school and Keystone seems behind.
- Challenge students more: My child gets straight A's without bringing anything home or studying.
- Raise more money for scholarships for the kids
- Take greater care in hiring teachers, including substitutes, to insure Keystone is hiring the most qualified teachers.
- I recommend that Keystone take much greater care of their current facilities, no matter which building.

I don't feel that there is enough done to really build this awareness so it is always a shock when the schools request more money
